President's Message

As fiscal year 2009 draws to a close, I am pleased to report that our association is making great strides toward adapting to the new environment in which our profession now exists. With the changes to our constitution that were approved by the membership in June, TASFAA is better positioned to correct the inequity of being labeled as a "lender" in some of the Code of Conduct agreements that were signed by some of our member institutions in the wake of the lender-school relationship scandal back

in 2006. As a result of that unfair and inaccurate labeling, many of our school representatives have been prohibited from participating fully in associational activities and leadership roles.

Within this new environment, flexibility and change are key words to remember. Congress is debating fundamental changes to the Part B loan programs, the Perkins Loan program, and the way that students apply for federal aid. The recession and dwindling resources have presented challenges to TASFAA in providing training opportunities for our membership. However, the TASFAA board stepped up to the plate this year and approved a budget that was lean but focused our energy into providing quality training, advocacy for our students with the 81st Texas Legislature, and an exceptional fall conference experience. Two fundamental changes were approved in our training programs. First, the Board approved a recommendation from the Early Awareness Committee to replace our traditional home grown curriculum for the High School Counselor Workshops with the National Training for Counselors and Mentors (NT4CM). Second, after NASFAA decided to reformat its Fall Training Series from a de-centralized model to a webinar training model, the Board directed the Regional Training Committee to revise its charge from facilitating the NASFAA de-centralized training sessions to creating a curriculum and conducting Spring training sessions around the state.

For over 40 years TASFAA has served Texas students and institutions, providing a leadership role in training, education and collaboration, developing future financial aid leaders and promoting access to higher education for all students. And we will continue. In 2009-10, under the able leadership of President Carolyn Jones and her board, the Association will face many challenges as the winds of change continue to blow. I am sure that when all is said and done, Carolyn will be able to write in her message in 2010 that the state of our Association is well.

Future committee plans include the updating of and training upon the online TRAINetwork, and creating an online archive of past data and other useful resources for the TASFAA community.

Fall Conference 2009 Committee

This year's conference theme is "TEAM UP for SUCCESS". The conference committee has been working hard to plan an interactive and informative professional development conference. The conference will be held at

the Arlington Convention Center October 7-9, 2009 and there will be numerous workshop activities and attractions to take advantage of in your free time.

We are all aware of the new regulations which will and have already impacted the financial aid industry; therefore the conference committee has lined up a wide selection of workshop sessions to cover. Topics on the agenda consist of the new Chapter 33- Post 9/11 benefits, available services and assistance programs for returning Veterans and their families, Direct Lending, Professional Judgment, Verification Processing, Cohort Default Rates, TEACH Grant, Tax Documentation, Professional Development, Cash Management, Simplified FAFSA application process, Team Building, Financial Literacy, Income Based Repayment and many more to choose from.

Presenters and guests for this year's conference will be colleagues from area colleges and universities, Federal Student Aid Office, Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board, SWASFAA and a representative from U.S. Senator, John Cornyn's office in D.C. The opening luncheon will begin with remarks from our current President Rick Renshaw, followed by guest speaker Drew Pearson and the Drum Café'; which will provide our attendants with words to encourage us to work effectively and collaboratively as a team, despite the trying times in the economy and budget cuts which have impacted our campuses and organizations.

Arlington is the home of the Texas Rangers Stadium, Six Flags over Texas, Hurricane Harbor, and the arrival of the new Dallas Cowboys Stadium! We have planned an exciting evening event, TASFAA's very own "Night at the Ballpark", which will be held in the Arlington Convention Center. Bring your favorite team jersey and team spirit, brush up on your singing for a swing at karaoke, and come join us for a night of fun as we conclude a week of work, collaboration, and networking during the conference.

Constitution/Bylaws Committee

The Constitution and By-laws committee had several charges from the TASFAA Board this year.

There have been several changes to the Policy and Procedure manual and the Constitution & By-Laws. These two documents must be reviewed to insure that all changes have been incorporated and that there is no conflicting information between the two. Anticipated date of completion to have the revisions posted to the TASFAA website is prior to the fall conference.

The committee was also instrumental in conducting an associational vote to change the Constitution and By-laws. Listed below is the information provided to the membership for the potential changes:



Recommendation #1: Constitution Article IV, Section 3, Memberships

Proposed: Associate membership shall be open to public and private agencies and organizations concerned with or engaged in the support and/or administration of student financial aid to include representatives of government agencies (state and federal), foundations, banks and other financial institutions, guarantee agencies, organizations involved in providing services and products to postsecondary institutions, and private and community organizations interested in student financial aid matters.

Associate member institutions play an active role in TASFAA activities, may serve as members of committees, and shall have all rights and privileges of membership except the right to vote, serve as a committee chair, or hold office on the Board.

Summary: This change will remove the associate member position from the board.

Recommendation #2: By-Laws, 1. Dues and Memberships, Section 1

Proposed: There shall be no initiation fee charged for admission to the Association. Thereafter, annual membership dues and due structure for voting membership, associate membership and individual membership will be established annually by a majority vote of the Board.

Summary: This change will allow the board to change both the amount of dues and the dues structure with a board vote instead of the constitutional amendment process.

Both changes were approved by the membership. These changes will be reflected in the on-line version of the C&BL.

Early Awareness Committee (Middle School & High School)

This year was an interesting year, with so many coming and going. The committee had most of their meetings as conference calls. The H.S. Counselor workbook was updated for the year, and it was decided by the recommendation of the Committee and approval of the TASFAA Board that we would go from paper workbooks to CD's. We contacted the schools to see who would participate the year in holding the Workshops for us and had a smaller list than the year before, but still had approximately 18 schools host the event for us. We mailed out a total of approximately 1,040 CD's, with most of those being given out at the Workshops. We had good evaluations, and mostly positive on the new CD's, some didn't like them as much as the workbook, I think that is just a matter of becoming familiar with the CD's. The good part is that they can print it off if they want. We also recommended to the TASFAA Board that this upcoming year we participate in

the NASFAA program called NT4CM for our upcoming training. They furnish all materials, and each state adds their part to it, they provide free registration and have a website that is very helpful for information, training events, etc. The training for this started in August. Since we don't start our new Committee Chairs, I asked Raul Lerma





and Linda Gonzales to take over so they would not have to come in during the middle of it. They are going to be the Committee Chairs this upcoming year. I do not feel that someone starting in the middle is good, this way they will know exactly what is going on, and start scheduling the training for this next year.

Finance Committee

The Finance Committee reviewed best practices based on information gathered at the NASFAA Leadership Conference.

Based on the review of best practices the finance committee made the following changes to the way the association conducts financial business.

Each month after the bank statement is received by Tia she will scan it and forward it to the President for review (currently Rick Renshaw). On November 1 of each year she will change who that information goes to for review as the new president takes office.

A spreadsheet was created of items that have to be renewed or paid on a somewhat regular basis and this spreadsheet will be added to the Policy & Procedure manual as an "Appendix C – Finance Calendar". This will help insure that important renewals/changes are not skipped or forgotten. This is a work in progress and will be adjusted as the need arises.

Membership Committee

The Membership Committee experienced a busy year! During the fall, several notices were sent out via the TASFAA listserv reminding institutions to renew their membership. When membership applications were completed, personal emails were sent out on behalf of TASFAA thanking them for renewing. In February, personalized emails were sent to all non-renewals outlining the benefits of TASFAA membership and detailed information on how to renew was provided. In March after obtaining a list of institutions that had not renewed from the previous year, the committee reviewed the report and decided to concentrate our efforts on institutions still participating in the business. At the TGSLC conference our committee met and divided up the list of potential renewals. Non-renewals attending the TGSLC conference received a follow-up contact. Others were contacted by phone and once again reminded that their membership had expired. This targeted campaign has garnered positive results for our organization as several institutions renewed. While our membership numbers are down from last year, that was to be expected due to the large number of institutions that have exited the industry.

Mentoring, Leadership & Diversity Issues Committee

Carolyn Jones did the Mentor presentation at the NAOW in May. From that presentation, we received 15

new protégé requests. We put a call out via the ListServe to find mentors with experience in POISE, BANNER and PEOPLESOFT. We had a tremendous response, and within one day were able to match all 15 protégés with mentors. We currently have 6 unmatched mentors.

We have not received much feedback from either protégés or mentors as to how the program is working for them, but the committee has been assigned the task to check on a portion of the matched list to insure that all are participating and will report hopefully by the time the actual Board meeting takes place. Updates will follow at that time.

Newsletter/Public Relations Committee

In March of 2002 the TASFAA Newsletter was first published in an online format which allowed the membership to have greater and faster access to news related to the association. As of February, 2009 the TASFAA Times is now offered online in a portable data format (pdf) to even better serve the needs of the membership. In this format it can be saved for future reference or shared with others to whom it might be of interest. We found that we still have a lot of members who like to print and read documents when they are away from their offices too. The stated mission of the Newsletter Committee has always been to provide information that is "For and About the Members of TASFAA". As diverse as the membership has become and as the complexity of financial aid has increased it has proven a difficult task to meet the needs of all. Since January of 2008 there have been seven editions of the TASFAA Times and seventy-two articles of interest included. These articles have included news from the President of TASFAA. The National Association of Student Financial Aid Administrators, Guarantors, Lenders, individual members, reports from TASFAA committees in each edition, and articles about individual members.

Nominations & Elections Committee

As Vice Chair for the Nominations and Elections Committee, I assumed the role as Chair on July 17th. Below is a listing of activities that our committee completed during the nominations and elections process.

Nominations process

- Worked with Alan Ahmad to activate nominations form on the website
- Distributed email to TASFAA listserv members notifying them of availability of nomination form, listing of open offices and instructions on how to complete nominations
- Sent out 2nd (of three) reminder emails to encourage nomination
- Contacted Nominations and Elections committee members for assistance in contacting members for participation in the nominations process
- Contacted six TASFAA members to personally request nominations



- Contacted the five departing board members to solicit interest in being nominated for an additional two years
- Received a total of eight nominations for the Board Members at Large and one nomination for President Elect.
- Contacted committee members to solicit additional nominations
- · Sent out final reminder for nomination to listserv
- Validated the list of nominations to determine that they were eligible to serve the TASFAA board
- After the close of nominations, presented the list of eligible nominations to the board for approval as the 2009 candidate slate

Elections process

- Communicated candidate slate to membership and announced the elections dates
- Sent out three reminders to the membership about the elections, including a reminder to financial aid administrators to verify who is assigned as the voting member for their institution
- Elections are scheduled to begin on 9/18/09 and end on 10/2/09
- The results of the election will be presented to the board at the board meeting, on the first day of the annual conference (10/6/09)

President's Advisory Council

The President's Advisory Council for Planning and Evaluation is responsible for evaluating the TASFAA Strategic Initiative and Goals for the Association with regard to meeting the objectives of the Association.

Upon the request of the TASFAA President, the group focus for the 2008-09 year was on Initiatives # 2 TASFAA Infrastructure #3 TASFAA Fiscal Stability. It was felt that changes in the student loan industry and the political climate in the state of Texas required that TASFAA evaluate its existing structure. The work done by PAC resulted in two recommendations for changes to the TASFAA Constitution and By-laws.

- A recommendation to change the TASFAA bylaws to allow for future changes in due structure without requiring a vote of the membership to change the bylaws.
- A recommendation to change Article IV Section 3 of the TASFAA Constitution to continue to allow Associate members to serve as members of TASFAA committees but removing the Associate member from the Board. The recommendation also included a more expanded explanation of what organizations could be considered for Associate membership.

PAC also made a recommendation that the TASFAA

Board take an active role in being aware of which lenders are involved in discriminatory lending

practices towards any of its members (traditional and proprietary) and officially notify the lender of the organizations concerns. PAC recommended that an open letter to all TASFAA members should be sent annually by the TASFAA President in support of the NASFAA Resolution regarding discriminatory lending practices

Scholarship Committee

As the training season approached the scholarship committee invited everyone to apply for the Mack C. Adams Professional Development Scholarship. The scholarship is available for the New Aid Officers Workshop (NAOW) in May and the TASFAA Fall Conference (TFC) in October. This scholarship was designed to assist financial aid professionals with the cost of attending these two training opportunities.

The scholarship not only allows you travel to training, it allows you to become a part of the wonderful financial aid community in the great state of Texas. Not only do you grow as a professional and as an individual, but you also have the opportunity to be a teacher and show others perspectives and ideas they may not have had without your presence at these trainings.

Application for the NAOW scholarship were made available February 27th. The deadline to submit the application was April 3rd and recipients were notified April 27th of award.

Application for the TFC scholarship were made available July 1st. The deadline to submit the application was August 7th and recipients were notified September 4th.

There were 31 applicants for the NAOW and we awarded 9 of those. For the fall conference there were 17 applicants and 6 were awarded.

Site Selection Committee

The primary goal of the Site Selection Committee is to anticipate the needs of the TASFAA membership under the guidance of the TASFAA Board of Directors. Understanding these needs will allow the Committee to research and develop the tools to solicit, review and recommend potential future training sites for the annual Fall Conference, New Aid Officers Workshop and other opportunities as deemed necessary by the TASFAA Board of Directors.

The objectives of the committee involve but are not limited to:

- · recommending suitable fall conference sites,
- obtain reasonable rates and accommodations for all attendees.
- · easy access from all parts of the state, and
- · assisting other committees in accomplishing their goals.



Regional Training Committee

As changes come down the pipe from NASFAA regarding training issues, it appears there are many concerns.

- This model cuts out the state and regional associations by making them optional middle men in the distribution plan.
- Offering four 1.5 hours sessions over the course of the fall and winter is not practical for travel time at 4 times the normal.
- Offering one all day showing of the four sessions is not practical because the full package will not be available until after the holidays and too late for effective timing. Most schools will not wait that long but go ahead and pay for the sessions themselves.
- As long as NASFAA allows its member schools to access the presentations themselves on an individual basis, there is no way that the associations can afford to offer the training in any format. Schools will almost universally choose to conduct at home and avoid the travel expenses.
- The cost of training local facilitator/trainers would be a waste of association money because there would be no need for sessions sponsored by the association.

It is this committee's recommendation that we continue to offer training as a deliverable, even without the NASFAA Decentralized training. We can make additions so that it incorporates more regulatory and professional development. We can continue to offer NAOW and ABC Workshops as well as our conference. Thus, offering something that everyone will benefit from and still provide service to our community justifying our membership fees.

Training Committee

The training committee has had a great and challenging year. We had a very successful New Aid Officers Workshop (NAOW) at St. Mary's University in May. The Training Committee would like to extend a hearty thank you to all of our speakers for NAOW who graciously volunteered their time to come to St. Mary's and share their wealth of knowledge with those who are new to our industry.

I would like to personally thank my committee members who stepped up to the challenges that were placed before us at NAOW. Thank you in no particular order to Vincent, Shana, Tricia, Elena, Erin, Yvonne, Devon, Denise and Consuela!!!! TASFAA should know how great of volunteers you all are and how committed you are to your professions and the students we serve.

Lastly, before I get into the meat of my report, thank the TASFAA Board and its assistance and backing for making NAOW a great success. Everyone reported that they enjoyed the involvement of the Board throughout the week. You all were a great encouragement to the new campers.

The Training Committee has been working hard since February 4th planning for NAOW and the upcoming ABC Workshop. We had a total of 83 campers registered and paid for NAOW. We had anticipated as a committee to have approximately 90 registered campers. We knew going in that the current economic climate and the new paradigm our industry is operating in would be a factor in our overall registration. We managed our expectations and kept down our costs as much as possible to hedge against this. The Training Committee utilized speakers local to the San Antonio area and included more activities on-site at St. Mary's University as other cost saving measures. Even by cutting costs, TASFAA and the Training Committee was still able to produce a very professional and successful training workshop.

Our total revenue for NAOW was \$29,825. The total expenses were \$29,446. This gives us a net profit of approximately \$379. I say approximately because part of the invoice from St. Mary's University includes TASFAA Board expenses that we have not been able to get itemized yet from the director of St. Mary's Conference Services. The Training Committee will come in under budget this year as we have worked hard to cut costs and expenses as much as possible.

To look toward the future, we are gearing up and getting our annual ABC Workshop finalized. We are looking forward to a great time in Arlington. I would like to thank Dana Mingo and the TASFAA Conference Committee for their help and support. She has been great to work with and wonderful in communicating our needs to the Arlington Convention Center staff.

As I pass on the Chair responsibilities to Devon Wiggins, I would like to thank the TASFAA Board and our president Rick Renshaw for your support and candid advice. I am looking forward to working with Devon next year in planning NAOW and ABC and assisting her any way I can.

The Training Committee will have a final committee meeting at the TASFAA Conference to go over what we have done this year and review all evaluations from NAOW and ABC to see what areas we can improve upon for next year. I know Devon is looking forward to and will have a successful 2010 as it relates to the Training Committee and its goals and agenda.

Tax Status

TASFAA is exempt from federal income taxation under Section 501(c) (3) of the Internal Revenue Code.

Cash and Cash Equivalents

For purposes and convenience of reporting, cash and cash equivalents are considered to be all cash and certificates of deposit.

Investment Policy

Treasurer will keep cash on hand in an amount sufficient to meet expenses and to prevent overdrafts or service charges. Investments, stocks, bonds, and certificates of deposit amounts and distributions will be monitored by the Board.

Note 2 - ING Investment Account

TASFAA maintains an investment account at ING. This account is not reported on the statement of cash receipts and disbursements, as it does not meet the definition for cash and cash equivalents in this cash basis financial statement. A summary of activity if this account at fair market value is as follows:

Note 3 - Off-Balance Sheet Credit Risk

TASFAA maintains bank accounts as well as certificates of deposit at three banks. Accounts at an institution are insured by the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation (FDIC) up to \$250,000. Cash at all three institutions were under federally insured limits at October 31, 2008.

TASFAA maintains a brokerage account. This brokerage account is insured by the Securities Investor Protector Corporation. The SIPC provides protection for all securities registered in TASFAA's name in amounts up to \$500,000 per customer for failure of a brokerage house. At October 31, 2008, the balance at the brokerage house did not exceed this insured amount.
